To equip with vital information on topics related to religious radicalism and new trends on radicalism in three regions; and, skills in conflict management, fact-finding and documentation. 3. To deepen their commitment/call in doing peacemaking as a ministry. <p>OUTPUT: Therefore, it is expected that after the training, the pastors will able to facilitate trainings and make plans of action on peacemaking in their own congregations and/or communities; and, actively participate in peace advocacy and conflict transformation in their own churches and communities.</p>

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	<p>b) Within the age limit of between 31 years old until 50 years old</p> <p>c) Ability to communicate in English (speak & write)</p> <p>d) Possess a one-year valid Passport (November 2017)</p> <p>e) Endorsed by the Church Leader (Ephorus/President/Moderator/Bishop)</p> <p>f) Committed to take part at the beginning and the end of the program.</p> <p>g) A person who is actively engaged in peace-making ministry, working in conflict or conflict-potential (religious/ethnic-political conflicts) areas and has possibility or position to implement plans on peace building activities or training in their respective churches.</p> <p>h) Each participant will write about their experience on religious radicalism/socio-cultural conflict in context of their community.</p>
<p>VII. ORGANIZERS / RESOURCE PERSON</p>	<p>UEM Asia Regional Office in coordination with UEM Africa and Germany for participants in their regions. And together with GKJTU-LPPL Noble Character Center in facilitating spiritual-meditative guides, and in providing exposure areas, food and accommodations.</p> <p>UEM Asia will identify and coordinate with resource persons and experts from churches or institutions (or among the participants) on peacemaking.</p>
<p>VIII. DIVISION OF TASKS</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. UEM Asia is responsible for drafting the ToR and budget for Asia Region. 2. UEM Asia/ Ira Sitorus is responsible for coordinating visa and flights of participants in close coordination with GKJTU 3. UEM Asia is responsible to arrange food, accommodations and transportation in Indonesia, as well as the resource persons for the topics. 4. GKJTU-LPPL Noble Character Center will provide the spiritual-meditative guides (morning and evening prayers), food, accommodation, exposure trips and program facilitation.
